## A BILL

- To designate the McGuire Memorial and McGuire Gravesite located in Pennsauken, New Jersey, as a National Historic Landmark, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "The Peter J. McGuire
- 5 Labor Day Landmark Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds the following:

1	(1) Peter J. McGuire joined the Cabinet Mak-
2	ers Union of New York in 1872 and, recognizing the
3	need for one international union of wood workers,
4	called for and led a convention of carpenters and
5	joiners in Chicago in 1881 that formed the Brother-
6	hood of Carpenters and Joiners which became the
7	United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of
8	America in 1888.
9	(2) The Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners
10	elected McGuire its first general secretary and re-
11	tained him in that position for twenty years.
12	(3) McGuire was a leader in convincing skep-
13	tical, locally-minded union activists around the
14	United States that a national labor federation was
15	not only necessary, but also possible.
16	(4) McGuire co-founded with Samuel Gompers
17	the Federation of Organized Trades and Labor
18	Unions and, in 1886, reorganized it into the Amer-
19	ican Federation of Labor.
20	(5) McGuire served variously as the American
21	Federation of Labor secretary and vice president be-
22	tween 1886 and 1900.
23	(6) McGuire successfully led the fight for the
24	eight-hour day in 1890.

(7) In 1882, McGuire proposed that "one day
 in the year be designated as Labor Day", a proposal
 that was adopted first by a number of States and
 then as the first Monday in September by an Act of
 Congress in 1894.

6 (8) Upon McGuire's death in 1906, the United 7 Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners commis-8 sioned from M.C. Lyons and Sons, Camden, and had 9 installed a massive granite multistage headstone on 10 McGuire's gravesite in the Arlington Cemetery at 11 1629 Cove Road, Pennsauken, New Jersey, inscribed 12 with "P.J. MCGUIRE, BORN JULY 6, 1852 13 DIED FEB. 18, 1906" and "FOUNDER OF U.B. 14 OF. C. & J. OF A".

(9) Beginning in 1906, each year labor leaders,
political leaders, families, and working people gather
at McGuire's gravesite on Labor Day to lay wreaths
and deliver speeches in tribute to McGuire and his
great work.

(10) As the anniversary of McGuire's centennial
birthday approached, the organizations he had
helped to found decided to install a new memorial a
short distance from McGuire's gravesite, consisting
of a central statue of McGuire embraced by a semicircular colonnade of marble columns.

1	(11) The McGuire Memorial, completed in
2	1952, includes—
3	(A) an outdoor sculpture of McGuire

made of Cherokee Georgia marble, that shows him standing with his left arm against his chest and right arm, elbow bent, at his waist, and dressed in a frock or mourning coat;

8 (B) an inscription carved on front of the
9 base of such sculpture that reads "PETER J.
10 MCGUIRE/JULY 6, 1852/FEBRUARY 18,
11 1906";

12 (C) a free-standing curvilinear colonnade
13 of six Greek Doric columns, also made of Cher14 okee Georgia marble;

(D) an inscription on entablature frieze of
the colonnade that reads "IN MEMORY OF
PETER J. MCGUIRE FOUNDER OF UBC
AND FATHER OF LABOR DAY"; and

19 (E) an inscription on the base of the col20 onnade that reads "ERECTED BY UNITED
21 BROTHERHOOD OF CARPENTERS AND
22 JOINERS OF AMERICA 1952".

23 (12) Several thousand people, many of them or-24 dinary union members, attended the McGuire Memo-

1	rial dedication ceremony on Aug. 9, 1952, which fea-
2	tured as speakers—
3	(A) the president of the New Jersey Fed-
4	eration of Labor;
5	(B) the mayors of Camden and Penn-
6	sauken;
7	(C) General President Hutcheson of the
8	United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners;
9	(D) the president of the American Federa-
10	tion of Labor, William Green;
11	(E) the secretary and treasurer of the
12	American Federation of Labor, George Meany,
13	who later attained national significance himself;
14	and
15	(F) the United States Secretary of Labor,
16	Maurice Tobin.
17	(13) In 1956, when a new postage stamp dedi-
18	cated to American labor was issued on Labor Day,
19	President Dwight Eisenhower held a special cere-
20	mony at the White House in which he met with the
21	family and descendants of McGuire.
22	(14) In 2004, McGuire was admitted to the
23	Labor Hall of Fame of the United States Depart-
24	ment of Labor, which has since been renamed the
25	Hall of Honor.

(15) The New Jersey Historic Preservation Of fice has documented McGuire as a figure of tran scendent national significance and importance in the
 labor history of the United States.

5 (16) The landscape characteristics, physical fea6 tures, overall layout, and visual appearance of the
7 McGuire Memorial and McGuire Gravesite reflect a
8 high degree of overall integrity in terms of location,
9 design, setting, materials, and workmanship.

10 (17) The sculptural representations of labor
11 and union themes associated with McGuire's career
12 as an effective labor leader and organizer that em13 bellish the McGuire Memorial and McGuire
14 Gravesite are intact and well-preserved.

(18) National political and labor leaders have
made annual pilgrimages to McGuire's gravesite
since 1906 and to the McGuire Memorial and
McGuire Gravesite every September on Labor Day
or the Friday before Labor Day since 1952.

(19) Unlike other known properties related to
McGuire, the McGuire Memorial and McGuire
Gravesite are the only properties that retain both
the necessary direct association with McGuire as a
person of national stature and the high level of integrity required for listing on the New Jersey Reg-

1	ster of Historic Places and National Register of
2	Historic Places.

3 (20) The McGuire Memorial and McGuire 4 Gravesite satisfy the criteria for graves of historical 5 figures and properties that have achieved signifi-6 cance within the past 50 years under the following 7 criteria consideration categories of the National Reg-8 ister of Historic Places—

9 (A) category (c), "a grave of a historical
10 figure of outstanding importance as there is no
11 appropriate site or building associated with
12 McGuire's productive life"; and

(B) catgory (f), "a property primarily commemorative in intent if design, age, tradition,
or symbolic value has invested it with its own
exceptional significance".

17 (21) In August 2017, the New Jersey State
18 Historic Preservation Office certified that the
19 McGuire Memorial and McGuire Gravesite are eligi20 ble for listing on the New Jersey Register of His21 toric Places and National Register of Historic
22 Places.

# 1 SEC. 3. DESIGNATION OF PETER J. MCGUIRE MEMORIAL 2 NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK.

3 (a) DESIGNATION.—The McGuire Memorial and
4 McGuire Gravesite, located in Pennsauken, New Jersey,
5 are hereby designated as the Peter J. McGuire Memorial
6 National Historic Landmark.

7 (b) ADMINISTRATION.—The United States shall not
8 be responsible for the maintenance, operation, or adminis9 tration of the Peter J. McGuire Memorial National His10 toric Landmark.

11 (c) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—The Secretary 12 may enter into cooperative agreements with appropriate 13 public or private entities for providing educational and in-14 terpretive facilities and programs for the public regarding 15 the Peter J. McGuire Memorial National Historic Land-16 mark.

17 (d) TECHNICAL AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.—The
18 Secretary may provide technical and financial assistance
19 to any entity with which the Secretary has entered into
20 a cooperative agreement under subsection (c).

(e) NO EFFECT ON ACTIONS OF PROPERTY OWNERS.—Designation of the Peter J. McGuire Memorial National Historic Landmark shall not prohibit any actions
which may otherwise be taken by any property owners,
including the owners of the Peter J. McGuire Memorial

- 1 National Historic Landmark, with respect to their prop-
- 2 erty.
